Welcome

I am delighted to welcome you to our 'Music at the Met' concert series for 2024. Music has played a vital role in the life of the Metropolitan Cathedral since its consecration in 1967, when an enviable musical tradition was set in place by Philip and Terence Duffy, respectively the first Master of Music and Organist.

Central to music-making in the cathedral is the grand organ, built by the English organ builders J W Walker & Sons, and whose distinctive façade was designed by the cathedral architect, Sir Frederick Gibberd. In 2021 work began on a once-in-a-generation refurbishment, carried out by Harrison & Harrison, organ builders based in Durham.

The organ restoration project involved the removal, cleaning and restoring of each of its 4,565 pipes, as well as modifying the location of parts of the organ. The failing winding system was upgraded and new digital electronic technology was installed, unlocking hidden potential previously unafforded to Walkers because of the restrictions of the original layout.

During 2024 we are celebrating the return of our restored grand organ with a series of concerts and events that will demonstrate the versatility of the instrument. On 12 May (the eve of the 57th anniversary of the dedication of the cathedral) we will rededicate the organ during the office of Choral Evening Prayer, which will be followed by the opening recital, played by the internationally renowned organist Martin Baker.

Throughout the inaugural season the organ can be heard in a variety of contexts. Recitals by Katherine Dienes-Williams (Organist of the Metropolitan Cathedral 1994-1997) and internet sensation Matthew Walters, sit alongside a concert given by Liverpool's two cathedral choirs with Professor Ian Tracey (Organist of Liverpool Cathedral). The instrument will also feature in Saint-Saëns' Organ Symphony, played by our own cathedral organist Richard Lea.

In September we will be holding a 24-hour Musicathon in the cathedral to raise money for the cathedral choir's trip to Cologne, the German city twinned with the city of Liverpool. The day will feature formal performances, a 'come and sing' event and the participation of former choristers of the cathedral choir.



Born in Manchester in 1967, Martin Baker studied at the Royal Northern College of Music, Chetham's School of Music and Downing College, Cambridge, then held positions at London's Westminster and St Paul's cathedrals before being appointed to Westminster Abbey at the age of 24. In 2000 he returned to Westminster Cathedral as Master of Music, where for 20 years he was responsible for directing the world-renowned choir in its daily choral programme and busy schedule of concerts, tours and recordings.

Martin Baker is much sought after as an organist, playing frequent solo concerts in the UK and around the world. In addition to playing a wide repertoire, he is known for his skill in improvisation, both liturgically and in concert, and was the winner of the Tournemire improvisation competition in St Albans in 1997. His first solo organ recording has just been released on the Ad Fontes label from Buckfast Abbey, where he played the opening concert on the new Ruffatti organ in 2018. He teaches both repertoire and improvisation and has appeared on the juries of several international organ competitions.

Matthew Walters, aka Reductio, has had a busy twelve months, gaining well over 100,000 followers across social media platforms. His unique combination of the classical and contemporary on both the organ and his own productions has gained him a fast-growing online following. His interpretations of modern music onto the organ have proven incredibly popular, and he has been relentlessly collating and posting these works online, as well as releasing his own classical compositions and electronic productions.

Matthew will play a mix of contemporary and classical music on the organ, including Bach, Zimmer, ABBA and some of his own original compositions. His performance will also feature a segment of audience participation, which will involve an audience member playing a short phrase upon which Matthew will improvise a piece.

Professor Ian Tracey has had a lifelong association with Liverpool Cathedral and its music, and with his two illustrious predecessors continues the tradition of an almost apostolic succession. In 1980 he became the youngest cathedral organist in the country, a post he has held for the past 43 years. Since his appointment, he has played most of the major venues in this country, and an increasing number in Europe; very much in demand in the USA, he has made 25 extensive tours, playing in all the major cities, and in 1999 and 2003 undertook major tours of Southern Australia, giving recitals, examining and teaching.

lan is Organist to the City of Liverpool and curator of the historic 'Father' Willis organ at St George's Hall, Liverpool, where he plays monthly recitals and officiates at civic functions. He is also Professor, Fellow and Organist at Liverpool John Moores University, and Tonal Director for Church Organ World. He was commissioned as a Deputy Lieutenant for the County of Merseyside in 2015.
